The most important things are cardboard, glue and scissors, but if you have other materials to decorate with that's great!


The boring bit


- Make sure you cover your work surface.

- When playing make sure not to lift your club above your knees and don't whack the ball!

Using the templates

You can print and stick the templates to some spare cardboard - why not recycle a cereal box or postage packaging? Then all you need to do is carefully cut the lines.






Fastening your course

When arranging the pieces of your course you can attach them to smooth surfaces with a little loop of tape, and for carpets you can use heavy objects (like a food tin) to keep them sturdy.

How to make the two things at the heart of crazy golf.


The Ball

You can buy cheap foam balls that are safe to use at home, but if you want to keep it DIY; You can make a simple, light ball with scrunched up foil or paper and masking tape.

The Club

Using the club template, trace the head onto a long piece of corrugated card. Extend the handle to your desired length, (from the floor to your tummy is ideal), and cut out the shape. repeat this two more times, then glue the pieces together.




Then cover the club in papier mache (strips of newspaper soaked in PVA mixed with water). Two or three layers is perfect. Once the glue is dry the club will be nice and strong and ready to paint in your favorite colour.


the hole

What would crazy golf be without a hole!? This simple shape is what will turn any patch of carpet into your very own golf course.

Simply cut out the **hole template** from some thin card, (a cereal box is ideal). Fold the tabs inward along the dotted line. push them down so that they are at an angle instead of completely flat. This is so the golf ball can roll in but not out.




Another option is to cut a section off of a paper cup so it can lie on its side on the floor.




This is a quick solution, but it does mean you can only pot the ball from one side. Maybe you could design the course with this in mind?
